

On a Friday afternoon some of the Year 1s and all of the Year 2s use the Senior Class laptops and participate in a computer programme called "Steps". The younger children use an alphabet app to practice their alphabet skills during this time.

The Steps programme supports our classroom reading programme and structured literacy. The children are introduced to a lot of words that appear as individual words and in sentences and these words are incorporated into games. The words are re-introduced again and again until they are confident with them. It helps children:

-decode words -recognise words -use the words in context -spell the word

-break the word up into syllables -match the words with its meaning -write the word

-use the word in a variety of memory activities

The programme automatically adjusts if children find something hard and it gives them more practice of that skill.

What's on in class?

Maths

This term we are working on our Addition and Subtraction strategies. The children did well to learn their family of facts to 10 in the first week which has helped them to work out harder equations.

For the Year 3 and 4 children, we are working on them being able to work out Addition and Subtraction equations in their heads without relying on materials, and the Year 5 children are working on addition and subtraction equations with 3-digit numbers by using several different strategies.

Writing

We are learning about Disasters for our topic work and integrating this into our writing. The children are in groups and are researching a disaster that has happened in New Zealand and are presenting their information in a range of ways. These include: a poster, TV interview, Radio report, brochure and a slide show.

Reading

The children continue to read with me daily. The older children have novels that they are reading and have set chapters to read at home each night. The younger children continue to have their reading books to read to an adult each night.

Thank you for filling out the homework books and listening to your child read.

They love sharing their books with you.

If I have been away, or the children don't have set pages to read on a night, the children can just read a book from home. This may happen over the next couple of weeks as I start the children's testing in preparation for the reports coming out at the end of next term.

Homework

This term you will have noticed I have started to send home Times Tables for the children to learn. I have decided to do this ahead of our Multiplication and Division learning next term, in the hope that they will be a step ahead with their knowledge before we start our strategy learning next term.

When learning a new set of tables, the children could learn them in order first. If they are finding them hard, I would suggest just taking 4 to learn at a time to cement them in their instant recall before moving on to the next ones.

Once they have started to have a better recall of them, then move on to calling them out, out of order. Once again, you could just do a few at a time until they have mastered them. It doesn't matter if it takes the children a couple of weeks to master one set of tables. I test the tables on a Friday morning and will move the children on when they can do that set out of order with quick recall.

R.E

We have started our Sacraments learning. The children know there are 7 Sacraments and are able to say the order in which they go in. We are starting to go through each Sacrament to learn more about them and what their significance is to the church and people's lives. We will also spend more time around the sacrament of Confirmation, which is coming up for some of our students early next term. The children involved have taken home a notice about this already.

This is often a busy term for families as there is a lot of sport on. I appreciate that it can be hard to juggle everything and am thankful for your support with the children continuing to get their homework done and ensuring your children are well-rested so they can concentrate on their learning when they are at school.

Everyone coming into New Zealand needs to complete an NZTD. You'll answer questions about your trip and what's in your bags. You can complete it at a time that suits you, on the NZTD website or by downloading the NZTD app, and submit it 24 hours before your trip back to New Zealand.




Change of season... Change of toothbrush!
