
Easter Services in our Church are:




Senior Class News:

Maths Trail

To solidify their understanding of measurement concepts covered this term, the students participated in a 'Maths Trail' around the school grounds. Each group of three students received an aerial map marked with various locations and corresponding codes. At each station, they were tasked with solving a measurement problem, documenting their thought processes in their booklets, and justifying their answers. The trail included stations requiring estimations, such as the height of the tree near the entrance, as well as those demanding precise measurements, like the area of the hall doors. This activity provided a valuable opportunity to observe how students applied their recent learning in a real-world context and how they approached various measurement challenges.









Camp Berwick

On Monday the 31st of March the Senior Class and some super parents went to Camp Berwick near Outram for 4 days. We met at school, packed our bags into the cars and headed off to Camp. We first stopped at Middlemarch to have a play on the playground and eat our morning tea. Then we kept going and arrived at Camp Berwick. We parked the cars and unpacked our bags into the rooms. After that, we met Tim who was our instructor. He was a nice guy and could whistle very loudly! Our first activity was the Team Building challenges and there were 3 different challenges which required lots of teamwork. We did well at these and there were lots of laughs. Then we had 3 more activities for the afternoon. My group first did the Confidence Course. It's a course with different challenges like tyres, rings you have to swing along, going through a tight net and the Berwick Challenge (where you try to turn around a horizontal pole without touching the ground) which was so hard. After that was Radio Orienteering where we had a map which had different points where we would find a letter. Lastly, we did the flying fox which was 30m long and a lot of fun.

The next day we did 6 activities. Our first activity was the Crazy Swing. We wore harnesses and we had to try and grab different coloured flags and you had to stretch so far. After that we did tree climbing where we had to climb this tall tree and it was fun. Then we went to abseiling. It was a wooden platform that went down onto a rock face and there was also a practice area. In the afternoon there were water activities. We went on push carts and ended up in the pond, kayaking where we played tag and raft building which ended up pretty much being a swim! The pond was really cold but we all enjoyed it.

On Wednesday we went to the Maungatua Adventure Centre. We went through a tight cave, did the high ropes and went on the 150m zipline. To get there we had to walk up this steep and long hill. The high ropes were my favourite activity because there were many challenging obstacles so we wouldn't get bored and we had to be brave.

On our final day at Camp, we did archery and air rifle shooting. With the air rifles, we had to shoot teddy bears and targets. Lastly was archery. We had 3 arrows to shoot at a target and it was hard work to pull the arrow back. Finally, we packed our bags, tidied our bunk rooms and went home. Camp Berwick was really fun, the food was delicious but sadly we had to leave.

The parents who came with us were amazing. They were really helpful and supportive during the activities and they were also funny. Camp wouldn't be able to happen without the parents. The food was very yummy, we ate all the baking and had dessert every night. The camp was fun.
